Nursery

There have been a few tears and lots of cuddles, but only three weeks in, the children are very happy learning the new routines, making new friends and doing what they do best, playing! In collaboration with art teacher Andrea, the children have produced some beautiful art pieces using pastels, ink, paint and pens. This week we even ventured out of school to the allotment to look for spiders and ladybirds and to pick apples, blackberries, tomatoes, nasturtium flowers and herbs to bring back to Nursery. What a fantastic start to the year!



Reception



September in Reception is a very special time and the children have enjoyed an amazing adventure exploring what starting school is all about. We read lots of starting school stories, before moving on to our first key text, Dirty Bertie, featuring a child with some rather unsavoury habits. The children are having a hilarious time helping Bertie to learn what's ok and what's not! The classrooms and profile books are starting to fill with gorgeous handprints. We are thrilled to have started daily phonics and weekly Mandarin and music lessons too.



Year I

It has been a fantastic start to the year with all the children in Year I settling in to the routines and their new classrooms beautifully. On 'In-day' we celebrated and investigated our new topic 'The World Through Our Senses', with the children tasting, smelling, touching, listening to and looking at an exciting array of sense-busting things. One activity that the children particularly enjoyed was pressing apples to make a delicious apple juice using a large wooden press — a very tasty and seasonal treat.



We have also been exploring our new Forest School site in Highgate Woods. This has included observing the changing seasons and hunting for treasure in the form of acorns and other falling seeds. Well done Year I for making such a great start to the school year.

Year 2



Year 2 children have also had a great start to the year. The children have already met many animals including a live water monitor lizard when 'Safari Pete' came to visit. They've been writing about 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears' and have learnt about habitats and food chains in science. They even found time to visit London Zoo where they had a wonderful time spotting lions and tigers, and marveling at the giraffes and penguins. Year 2 are most definitely on the way to becoming true animal experts.

Year 3



Year 3 have been honing their historical and scientific skills this month in our fantastic topic 'From Paleontology to Archaeology'. First, they explored the school and searched for the remains of dinosaurs, before researching and writing informative dinosaur reports. They enjoyed working collaboratively to make Stone Age cave paintings which now decorate the walls of our classrooms. After discovering that fossils are in fact rather special rocks, we have started comparing and investigating a range of rocks and their properties. Finally, the children have been fascinated by the story of the pioneering fossil hunter and paleontologist, Mary Anning, who made her first remarkable discovery at the tender age of 12. This story has inspired some of the children to go digging to find their own fossils in the hope that they too might discover something wonderful.

Year 4



Year 4 have settled in beautifully upstairs and are enjoying all that this year's varied curriculum offers. Launching straight into the 'Masks and Minotaurs' topic on our In-day, the children designed their own labyrinths and navigated one themselves. They even

faced and defeated the Minotaur, although some reported he had familiar footwear. Since then, we have enjoyed learning about Greek Gods, heroes and mythical creatures. In Geography, the children learnt about the physical features of Greece, identifying its many mountain ranges and creating a 3D map. Finally, Year 4 have started their swimming lessons, impressing us with their resilience, kindness and maturity.

Year 5



Year 5 have hit the ground running with all things Victoriana. In our topic, "A Victorian Education," the children are honing their history skills to investigate the lives of ordinary people, especially children, during the Victorian era. We have investigated jobs that Victorian children had such as shining shoes, sweeping chimneys, catching rats and even finding "pure." Ask the children what pure is. We have also looked at individual characters in the wider geopolitical lens of the British Empire and discussed what that means for different groups of people around the world. 5DC kicked off this year's assemblies with a highly entertaining recreation of Highgate Board School in 1877.

Year 6



Why can't you play hide and seek with mountains? They always peak.

That is the sort of hysterical joke that has welcomed this lucky group of children to their final year at Highgate Primary School. In case you haven't already heard, they will be heading to Pendarren in November - and in preparation for that week, our first topic is all about mountains. Geography lessons have looked at the Brecon Beacons and the surrounding area, and how it differs from humble Highgate. Both classes can now identify the world's major mountain ranges, classify the different types, and use Ordnance Survey maps to better understand a landscape. Mountains have

long been a source of inspiration for writers, so it comes as no surprise that our English lessons have been very varied. They have already written their own mountain poems, short adventure stories and biographies about Tenzing Norgay. What a start!

Year I made the most of lovely fresh produce from our allotment and a family's garden by making a spectacular 'Apple and Blackberry Crumble', rubbing in the butter and flour like professionals! Year 3 used ingredients that early man would have foraged, carefully crafting 'Ammonite Swirls' out of fruit and berries by wrapping them in filo pastry. A light dusting of icing sugar was the perfect finishing touch. Year 2 ditched meat in favour of beans and vegetables to make a nutritious and tasty Spicy Bean Burger; proving that there is no need for meat. Year 4 were influenced by a Greek favourite,
